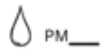

The yolk is often thought to be the chick, it is actually the chicks food.

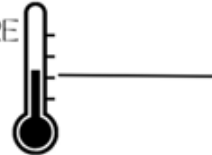




ACTIVITY

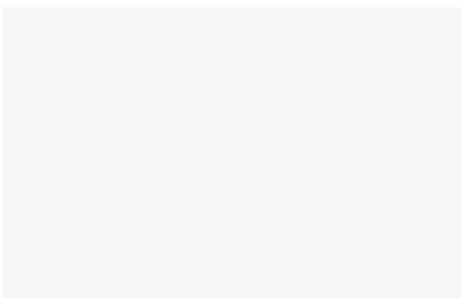


ACTIVITY

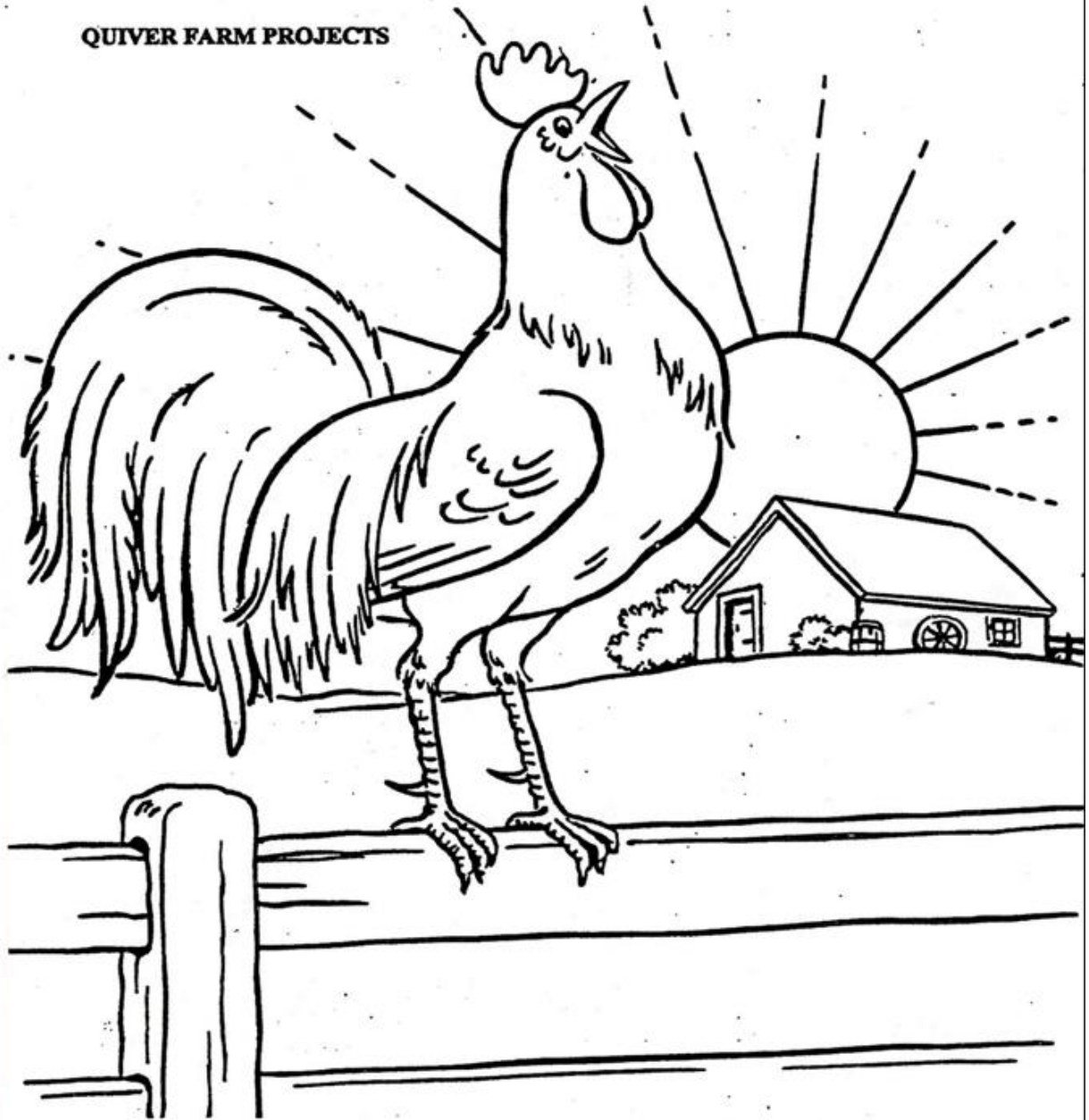

Hatching Journal Guide

Hello! Thank you for purchasing our hatching journals for your kids! Here are some notes on how you can use these journals to enhance your hatching program.

Each journal has a place in the beginning for the children to write their name, their teacher and grade. As well as the date they started the program and the date they finished it. The next page is a calendar page so they can map out when their eggs were delivered and when they are due to hatch.

At the top of each journal page, you can add the date and circle which day of the week it is.

Each day has a fun fact, required jobs of hatching/caring for chicks on that day. A place to mark that you added water, turned the eggs, and checked the temperature or for after the chicks arrival, they were fed, watered and cleaned the bedding. There is also a suggested activity and an area for writing and/or a space for a drawing.

There are five egg/incubation day pages and five chick day pages.

After the journal pages there is a hatch announcement, Drawing/Writing page, five coloring pages and two pages of simple questions designed to reiterate what was taught and what they loved about the program. The last page leaves room for pictures to be pasted.

In total these books have writing, calendar, temperature, responsibility, coloring, drawing, creative building, cutting and pasting all wrapped up in an easy booklet to take home as a wonderful memory to hold onto.

Extra note: The rooster and hen coloring pages can be used as “Name the Parts” activity.
